

Sixth Grade Country in a Box Projects

Now that you have some basic knowledge about the geography of planet Earth, you are to become an expert on one specific country. After choosing your country, you will be responsible for discovering as much information about this country as you can, and sharing the information you learn in an attractive and organized way. This project will require a large amount of focus, creativity, and researching.

To share your research with your peers, you will be decorating a **pizza box** with facts about your country's traditions, customs, geographical features, food, living conditions, etc. You will have at least four Social Studies class periods to work on this project. Anything not completed during work time will be homework. The requirements listed below must be included on your box to receive full credit.

Your final COUNTRY IN A BOX project will be due on Monday, June 1st.

Outside Cover/Lid:

This will be the first impression that people see when they look at your project. Therefore, your cover should be inviting, colorful, and should make people want to open your box and explore what is inside.

Therefore, there should not be much blank space on the cover. Your cover must include the following:

- Country Name
- Your Name
- Colors that represent your country (this is likely the colors from your country's flag)
- Pictures that represent the culture, traditions, and landscape of your country

Inside of the Lid:

This part of the project will include specific information about your country. This area is designated for "Quick Facts" about your country, which should be displayed in a neat and creative way. This section must include the following details:

Name of Your Country

Quick Facts:

1. **Gross Domestic Product (GDP)** – This is the value of all goods and services produced within your country each year. It is an indicator of your country's overall wealth.

GDP for the United States in 2012, as a point of comparison, was \$15.68 trillion.

2. **Per Capita GDP** – This is the amount of money that each person in the country would have if the country's GDP was shared equally between all members of the population. Per Capita GDP is an indicator of the country's standard of living.

Per Capita GDP for the United States in 2012, as a point of comparison, was \$49,965.27.

3. **Life Expectancy for Males and Females** – This is the average age that people die in your country.

4. **Literacy Rate** – This is the percent of people who are considered literate (able to read and write).

As a point of comparison, the entire world's literacy rate in 2010 – the percent of people living on our planet who were 15 years old or older and could read and write – was 84.1% and 88.6% for men and 79.7% for women.

5. **Infant Mortality Rate** – This is the number of infant deaths (babies under 1 year old) per 1,000 live births. This is often used as an indicator of a country's level of health.

As a point of comparison, the Infant Mortality Rate in the United States was about 5.2 in 2013.

6. **Arable Land** – This percent of total land area tells the amount of land in your country that is used for farming or animal grazing.
7. **Population Density** – This is the number of people that would live on each square mile or square kilometer of land in your country, if the homes of all members of the population were equally spaced between your country's borders.
8. **Poverty Rate** – This is the percent of people in your country who live in poverty, defined as lacking both money and the basic necessities needed to successfully live, such as food, water, education, healthcare, and shelter.

As a point of comparison, the United States' poverty rate was about 15.1% in 2010.

9. Name of Currency (money) and Exchange Rate with the U. S. Dollar
10. Language(s) Spoken

Customs and Courtesies:

1. Describe at least two important customs in your country.
2. Describe at least two ways that people greet each other.

Government:

Name and describe/define the type of government in your country. Use sixth grade language.

Climate:

Name and describe/define the climate type in your country. Use sixth grade language.

Recipe (A traditional food dish eaten in your country):

1. The name of the dish
2. A list of the ingredients
3. Directions on how to prepare this dish, if available

Bottom (Where the pizza would be placed):

This part of the project shows that you have thought about your country, and compared it to other countries around the world. This portion must include the following:

A major geographical feature (mountain range, rain forest, canyon, volcano...)

1. Name a geographical feature that is located in your country.
2. Represent this geographical feature with an appropriately colored picture or a model.
3. Write a description of the feature that is many sentences in length and gives the most important information (height, depth, length, location, type).

Flag:

1. Colored sketch or picture of the flag of your country
2. A short description of the flag, including what the colors symbolize, what the symbols represent, etc.
3. The country's Independence Day and who they won their independence from.

Map:

1. Download the appropriate map from Mrs. Steele's website and color your country.
2. Name your country's capital city and indicate its location on the map.
3. Tell your country's absolute location (latitude and longitude coordinates)
4. Write 2 or 3 sentences about your country's relative location, or location in relation to other countries, oceans, large bodies of water, etc.

A Country Comparison:

1. Create a two-circle venn diagram to compare and contrast your country with the United States. What makes the two countries similar? What makes them different?
2. Use your venn diagram to answer the following question: *If you had the opportunity to move to your country for a year, would you go?* Explain why or why not in a well-written paragraph that is many sentences in length. Be sure to note what challenges and opportunities the country would provide that you would not experience in the United States.
